HOW DID THE TERM "MERCY" ORIGINATE?

Definition: The act of forgiving someone or not treating them severely, especially by someone who has the authority to punish.

Online Etymology: Late 12th century, "God's forgiveness of his creatures' offenses," from Old French *mercit, merci* "reward, gift, kindness," from Latin *mercedem*. In Church (6c.) applied to the heavenly reward of those who show kindness to the helpless.

- Buddhism Quan-Yin, the Goddess of Compassion and Mercy, is also known as "she who harkens to the cries of the world".
- Used in the early Christian ages for the reward that is given in heaven to those who have shown kindness without hope of return.
- Islam is a religion of mercy; Allah has commanded that mercy be applied to everything and in every action
- Roman Catholic The Divine Mercy is a devotion focused on the mercy of God and its power, particularly as a form of thanksgiving and entrusting of oneself to God's mercy.

Conventional Wisdom: Mercy = Leniency for a crime or wrongdoing

Zen: A blessing is bestowed when mercy seasons justice

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
